COMPANION PET STANDARD (Longhair and Shorthair)

(Standard Source: QICC 2002)

General

The Companion Pet is the best known and most numerous variety of cat and is the much-loved companion of many households. There is absolutely no limit to or restrictions on type, pattern or coat. For the purpose of this standard the Companion Pet includes domestic cats of unknown breed, and cats that may be of a recognised breed that are pets only. Where a Companion Pet appears to be of a recognised breed, there is to be no consideration of that breed's standard of points in the assessment as a Companion Pet; all compete on an equal basis.

Head/Eyes/Ears/Neck:

Any, head shape, eye shape and colour, nose length, ear size and shape; neck

size and length. Eyes should be bright and the ears clean.

Body/Legs/Feet: Any size, shape or length but must be in good condition indicating overall

good health, neither too light nor excessively overweight.

Tail: May or may not have a tail, no penalty to be applied for kinked or broken tails

(providing any injury has healed and the exhibit is not distressed through the

tail being handled).

Coat: All coat colours and patterns in both long and short hair length are permitted.

The coat should be immaculately presented with no sign of parasites, dirt or

lack of grooming.

Remarks: Do not penalise:

(a) cats that are blind, missing one or both eyes provided the cat is confident in its

environment.

(b) cats with missing legs; or

(c) other deformities not effecting the overall good health or well-being of the cat.

Temperament: This is most important element of the standard; the ideal cat is outgoing and

friendly without being nervous or timid.

Penalise: Poor presentation, nervous or timid disposition.

NOTE The Judge may ascertain if the cat has been shown before and

consideration may be given to a novice exhibit.

Withhold Award: Bad temperament preventing the cat from being judged.

SCALE OF POINTS

Deductions are made at the judge's discretion for: poor presentation and temperament.

The final assessment is based on the judge's own choice and their 'communication' with the exhibits.
